Overview of Early Childhood Services in Connecticut 2014 Office of Early Childhood & Other Early Childhood Partners

Young Children in Connecticut

- **38,815** Children entered kindergarten in Connecticut in the fall of 2013.¹
- **74,201** Three- and four- year olds in the state, 2010 + 2011 births.²
- **14,853** Children in kindergarten eligible to receive Free/Reduced-priced meals, family income below 185% of Federal Poverty Level (FPL).³
- 37,962 Children under age 6, below 100% of poverty⁴

These children live in every community in the state.

After children enter kindergarten many of the services they need are coordinated through the schools.

Services for children, birth to age five, are now (or will be soon!) coordinated by the new Office of Early Childhood.

Early Care and Education

- School Readiness <u>10,830 school readiness</u> full-day, part-day and school-day spaces for 3- and 4-year-old children at 318 sites in 67 Priority and Competitive School Readiness communities. ⁵ There are an additional 543 school readiness extended-day spaces.
- Child Day Care Centers 2,295 pre-school spaces, for 3- and 4-year-old children, plus 449 pre-school wrap-around spaces contracted at 104 sites in over 52 communities. There are 1,131 Infant/Toddler spaces plus 142 Infant-toddler wrap-around, and 242 school-age spaces contracted.⁶
- Head Start <u>6,124</u> spaces served 3- , 4- and 5- year-old children last year.
- Connecticut Even Start Family Literacy Program 39 children, birth to 5 years old, and their parents comprehensive family-centered education services for two generational academic and economic success.⁷
- Public School Preschool <u>11,442 children</u> ages 3- and 4-year-old attended preschool in Public, Charter, or Magnet schools (includes approximately 4,447 children receiving special education, through IDEA Part B, Section 619, but does not include 4,978 kids also in School Readiness & Head Start).⁸

Child Care Subsidies

Care 4 Kids – 19,855 child care vouchers/subsidies issued in the month of December 2013, included care of 7,201 Infant/Toddlers + 6,993 Pre-School Age + 5,661 School-Age Children.⁹ Care 4 Kids Vouchers may be used at Licensed, License Exempt, and Family, Friends and Neighbor (FFN) settings¹⁰

Total Children Birth to age 5

193,070 Children in Connecticut are between birth and five years in age.¹

Services for Young Children and their Families

Home Visiting services to improve outcomes for families with young children at risk or in high-risk communities:

- Early Head Start 659 families participated in FFY 2013¹¹
- Family School Connections 189 Parents Participated in FY 2013
- Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program (CT DPH) 651 Families Enrolled (3/13–2/14)¹²
- Nurturing Families Network 2,371 Parents Participated in FY 2012
- Parents as Teachers & Child First services are available in Connecticut.

Early Intervention services for children under age 3 identified with developmental delays (Birth to Three, CT DDS):

• Birth to Three (IDEA Part C) - 9,345 Children with developmental delays or disabilities served in FY 2013.¹³

Early Childhood Special Education and related services, (CT SDE):

 Preschool Special Education (IDEA Part B, 619) – and related services in pre-kindergarten through local education organizations = 4,447 three- and four- year old children.¹⁴

Information and Referral

- Child Care Infoline fulfills the Child Care Resource and Referral mandate and handles child care referral.
- Help Me Grow / Child Development Info Line 1,918 Calls Received in FY 2012.¹⁵

Early Care and Education Workforce

Early Care and Education Workforce Development

- Workforce Registry 15,281 early childhood teachers, directors, trainers, and consultants are in the registry.¹⁶
- Scholarships to improve workforce qualifications 787 individuals received scholarship assistance and 57 licensed child care programs received group-based professional development scholarships.¹⁷
- Connecticut's Early Childhood Teacher Credential (ECTC) earned by 73 Individuals in 2013.¹⁸
- UMass Donahue Center/CT Head Start Training & Technical Assist. Center 1,822 staff supported 2014¹⁹

Program Standards

Child Care and Youth Camp Licensing

• Licensed Child Care programs - 3,953 Licensed Child Care facilities - include 1,474 Child Day Care Centers + 2,454 Family Day Care Homes + 25 Group Day Care Homes and **509 Youth Camps** are licensed.²⁰

Accreditation

- National Association Education of Young Children (NAEYC) 437 accredited programs 29,362 kids served.²¹
- CT has the highest number in the country of NAEYC Accredited programs per capita. Annually, approximately 100 center-based programs receive technical assistance on program improvement & NAEYC Accreditation.
- CT is ranked third by number of NAEYC accredited programs, following MA and CA, respectively.

- National Association for Family Child Care (NAFCC) 2 accredited programs
- National AfterSchool Association (NAA) 1 accredited program
- Head Start and Early Head Start compliance is deemed a high-quality standard.

Families and Employment

In Connecticut, nearly three-quarters (70%) of young children have all parents in their home working or seeking employment.²²

- Nearly all young children (93%) live in families with at least one parent employed or looking for work.²³
- Over one-quarter (27%) young children live in a single mother household.²⁴
- Over one-third (34%) young children live with only one parent.²⁵
- In 2012, more than a quarter (27%) of Connecticut women who gave birth had a high school education or less.²⁶

Early Care and Education Facilities

Early Childhood Bond Funds for Minor Capital Improvements and Wiring for Technology: Grants-in-aid to municipalities and organizations for facility improvements and minor capital repairs to state-funded programs serving children birth-5 and to additional EC programs serving children birth-5 in municipalities eligible for state early childhood funds

Cohort 1 - 76 projects at 57 program sites serving 4,984 children in 35 towns²⁷
