		 Campaign for Play: OEC launched a "Campaign for Play" to highlight the importance of play for children's learning and development. Play materials (posters, informational flyers, family flyers) are available on the OEC website and would be mailed to licensed centers. Feedback was requested on the materials and how to best distribute them to parents and families. Subcommittee & Advisory Committee Feedback	Amber, Region 5 Kelly S., Region 4 Tricia, Region 4	 Access and Affordability: Discussed a "one-point portal" (name TBD) being developed The portal aims to allow parents to see center availability, costs, locations, upload documents, communicate with providers, and register for programs Clarified it's in early stages and will help families identify services they qualify for (e.g., Birth to Three, childcare), aligning with the Blue Ribbon Plan Statewide Early Childhood Inclusion: A Padlet is being used to gather resources, agencies, and programs for families, focusing on those with special needs or disabilities for all backgrounds The goal is to break down resources regionally to identify strengths and needs. Padlet link was shared for members to input what they know or where there is a need and no resource aware of. Parent and Caregiver Survey Committee: OEC and UConn are collaborating to update the parent survey, which will be digital and take approximately 13-15 minutes to complete 	Members will soon give feedback on the portal. Regional Breakouts		 Groups had 20 minutes to discuss region mapping, connection goals, outreach strategies, or community challenges Region 3 (Tiffany): Plans to attend local collaboratives, research past/current family advisory boards (e.g., RACFAB in Colchester), and connect with existing family groups to share information Region 4 (Tricia): Focused on strategies to reach out to more fathers and include their voices, as they are often less visible at community events and childcare settings Chenae's Suggestion: Encouraged members to wear Parent Cabinet t-shirts or name tags at public events (like sports games) to spark conversations and share information about the Parent Cabinet and OEC. Jennifer shared success with this approach. Jenny highlighted the need to reach those with varying work schedules. 	
Home Visiting + Even Start+ Doula support for women impacted by incarceration	Luz Rivera (OEC Family Support Division)	OEC Home Visiting Program: OEC funds four evidence-based home visiting models, all free and voluntary: Child First: Serves children prenatal to age 2. Involves a mental health clinician and care coordinator, focusing on child-parent psychotherapy and parental competencies Healthy Families America (HFA): Serves children	Share out with their regions and if any questions please share with Chenae and Luz. • Information on becoming a

- prenatal to age 3-5. Focuses on nurturing parent-child relationships using a strength-based approach
- Nurse Family Partnership (NFP): Serves first-time mothers prenatal until the child is 2. Registered nurses provide visits focusing on prenatal/maternal health and child development
- Parents as Teachers (PAT): Serves families prenatal to age 5. Curriculum-based, focuses on parent-child interaction, school readiness, and community resources
- Approximately 3,100 families were served in FY24 →.
 Program information is searchable by town on the OEC website
- Even Start Program: (Overseen by Haley Scott) Serves families
 with children up to age 7. Requires parent enrollment in a
 GED program. Includes adult education, early childhood
 education, parenting support, and literacy activities. Home
 visits are once a month. Three sites available
- Doula Services at York Correctional Institution:
 - OEC collaborates with Lawrence Memorial Hospital, YCI, and Empowered Beginnings to provide doula services to incarcerated mothers
 - Currently 13 pregnant women at YCI; 30 births supported since 2022
 - Initiatives include housing pregnant/postpartum women in one unit, resulting in increased breast milk pumping
 - L&M Hospital provides PAT home visiting, Circle of Security, and Peace and Love groups at YCI, and donates supplies
 - Doulas from Empowered Beginnings offer prenatal/postnatal groups, attend births, create baby books, provide essential needs, and make referrals to home visiting programs
 - O Home visiting services are now also offered at York
