

Background

PRELIMINARY DRAFT

Qualified Staff Member ("QSM")

An educator who is:

- <u>Role</u>: Teacher (not assistant teacher) or family child care owner
- Meeting certain education qualifications
- Working in a specific classroom or home setting over 60% of the classroom's hours

Designated Qualified Staff Member ("DQSM")

Every state-funded program assigns a QSM (in Registry) for each classroom/home with infants through preschoolers.

🔆 Goals

- Encourage high quality early childhood education
- Support teaching staff to achieve ECE coursework and degrees



Updates in the Legislation

What is Changing on July 1, 2025?

- 1. A more gradual **phase-in** of education requirements for DQSMs (60% of each center's DQSMs meeting degree requirements by 2030, down from 100%)
- 2. Educators can be "working toward" an early childhood degree and meet DQSM, with supervision
- 3. State-funded family child care programs (FCCs) are included, with slightly different requirements
- 4. For educators with a college **degree in any field**, more options to be a DQSM by completing **12 credits in early childhood education** (does not yet apply to FCCs)


New! Scholarships to complete 12 OEC-defined foundational college credits in ECE

- Starting May 2025, OEC will provide scholarships to complete 12 specific ECE credits at partner colleges
- Providers may be eligible if they have fewer than 12 ECE college credits, even if they have a non-ECE degree.

DQSM Options: Centers, Group Homes and License Exempt Programs

Bachelor's degree or higher in a non-ECE field, AND one of:

- CT State Department of Ed. (CSDE) Early Childhood Certification
- Grandfathered/Deemed to meet requirements
- 12 OEC-defined foundational ECE credits
- The CT State Department of Education (CSDE) recently added Pre-K and Kindergarten to some existing elementary education endorsements.
- For consistency across settings and policies, the OEC will count this "added" endorsement as ECE only when the holder has 12 credits specifically in early childhood education.

Next steps?

Teachers should submit their transcripts for a review of these credits in the Registry.



DQSM Options: Centers, Group Homes and License Exempt Programs

Bachelor's degree or higher in a non-ECE field, AND one of:

- CT State Department of Ed. (CSDE) Early Childhood Certification
- Grandfathered/Deemed to meet requirements
- 12 OEC-defined foundational ECE credits

Were you previously grandfathered? Nothing will change. Educators grandfathered in 2015 all still meet QSM.

OR

☑ Do you have 12 Early Childhood credits? Based on provider feedback, a bachelor's degree in any field AND 12 ECE credits will be deemed to meet QSM, as long as the credits are reviewed in the Registry before July 1, 2030.




Bachelor's degree or higher in a non-ECE field, AND one of:

- CT State Department of Ed. (CSDE) Early Childhood Certification
- Grandfathered/Deemed to meet requirements
- I2 OEC-defined foundational ECE credits
- Do you have a BA in a field other than ECE and less than 12 ECE college credits? The OEC will provide scholarships at select colleges (e.g., Charter Oak, CT State) to get your 12 foundational ECE Credits in the following competency areas (one 3-credit class per area):
 - 1. Introduction to Early Childhood Education
 - 2. Child Development
 - 3. Health, Safety, and Nutrition (content combined into one ECE specific course)
 - 4. Child, Family, and Community

Mid-May 2025: <u>OEC scholarship</u> launches for the summer and fall semesters to pay for up to 12 OEC-defined foundational ECE credits!





*Supervisors are people who hold a BA or higher in ECE, who are able to support reflection about curriculum and best practices.

What can providers do to prepare?

- 1. Ensure your **Registry account is updated with current transcripts**.
- 2. Work with a Registry Advisor for information on how to plan your next steps.
- **3. Apply for a scholarship** through the Registry to pursue a degree in early childhood education.
- **4. If you already hold a degree:** Do not enroll in a CDA (entry level, pre-degree) program.
