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Executive Summary

Per the <u>Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) Act of 2014</u>, a market rate assessment is required as part of the state's 2025-2027 Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Plan. As such, the Office of Early Childhood (Lead Agency), in partnership with United Way of Connecticut, conducted a Market Rate Survey between September and December 2023 to determine weekly market rates in each region and across the state for licensed centers and licensed family child care home providers.

In total, 842 providers working in licensed child care centers or group child care homes (n=401; 48%) and family child care homes (n=441; 52%) in Connecticut participated in this Market Rate Survey. These respondents represent 27% of all licensed child care center/group home (n=1,473) and 24% family child care providers (n=1,843) in the state of Connecticut. Response rates for child care center and group home providers (25%-37%) and family child care home providers (20%-30%) varied by geographic region.

The following are select findings from the analysis of Market Rate Survey data collected between October and December 2023:

- For full-time care, the weekly cost for 75% of Connecticut's enrollments by age in licensed **child care centers/group homes** was \$470 or less for infants/toddlers; \$338 or less for preschoolers; and \$275 or less for school-aged children.
- For full-time care, the weekly cost for 75% of Connecticut's enrollments by age in licensed **family child care homes** was \$350 or less for infants/toddlers; and \$300 or less for preschoolers and school-aged children.
- Market rates in the Southwest region of Connecticut are generally higher than in other regions.
- As exemplified in the 75th percentiles described above, the following patterns emerged across percentiles: (1) infant/toddler care is generally more expensive than care for preschool or school age children and (2) center/group home care is generally more expensive than family child care home-based care (with some exceptions; e.g., see Figures 7-8 on School Age 50th percentile rates).
- Care 4 Kids rates generally fall below the 50th percentile (exceptions include infant/toddler rates in licensed family homes in Eastern region; licensed center/group home preschool rates in Southwestern region; see Figures 4-5).

Care 4 Kids rates were approved to increase by 11% for licensed center, exempt center, licensed group home, and licensed family child care home providers, in state fiscal years 2024, 2025, and 2026, with each 11% increase above the prior year rates. Unlicensed relative provider rates were approved to increase by 6% in state fiscal years 2024, 2025, and 2026.





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Overview

Per the <u>Child Care and Development Block Grant (CCDBG) Act of 2014</u>, a market rate assessment is required as part of the state's 2025-2027 Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Plan. Specifically, this Act requires Lead Agencies to establish provider payment rates based on valid methodologies, such as a market rate survey, to ensure base payment rates are set at levels sufficient to cover health, safety, staffing, and quality costs incurred by providers. Connecticut's Care 4 Kids Child Care subsidy program, funded by CCDF, allows low-income families to afford child care and, as such, allows caregivers to maintain employment and/or participate in training, workforce development, and education programs. Rate setting based on such methodologies can ensure high-quality care for those children receiving CCDF-funded care.

United Way of Connecticut, 2-1-1 Child Care, conducted a Market Rate Survey of licensed early care and education providers on behalf of the Office of Early Childhood. Data were collected between September and December 2023 to determine statewide and regional market rates for licensed centers/group homes and licensed family child care home providers. The analysis herein, conducted by the University of Connecticut (UConn) School of Social Work (SSW), provides context for current subsidy payment rates, showcasing their purchasing power and adequacy when it comes to providing equitable access in the child care market. Market rates are reported by region and statewide, as are differential rates for special populations.

Market Rate Survey Design and Methodology

To satisfy CCDF regulatory and 2025-2027 State Plan requirements, the Market Rate telephone survey of early care and education providers was undertaken by United Way of Connecticut, 2-1-1 Child Care, from September 2023 to December 2023, on behalf of the Office of Early Childhood. <u>2-1-1 Child Care</u> is Connecticut's statewide child care resource and referral agency operated by United Way of Connecticut. 2-1-1 Child Care maintains a database of child care providers licensed by the Office of Early Childhood. The database is used for resource and referral purposes and is separate from the database of child care providers participating in the subsidy program.

2-1-1 Child Care conducted an initial email campaign to all child care programs in their database which consisted of over 3,100 programs. Emails were resent to non-openers one week after the initial send date. Additional outreach consisted of scheduled postings to a listserv and a campaign to Staffed Family Child Care Networks. Subsequently, non-responders were identified and emailed weekly, and 2-1-1 Child Care staff conducted outbound calls to complete 2 cycles of calls to all non-responders.

All numbers reported, and data analyzed herein, were provided by United Way of Connecticut or were publicly available on the OEC website.

Questionnaire

United Way of Connecticut's 2-1-1 Child Care team obtained information on child care providers' charges via a voluntary, standardized survey that was administered by phone. Respondents were asked to supply information on weekly child care fees by





type of setting (defined as "family child care home" and "child care center/group home" in the present report), hours of care, and age group of children served (see Table 1). Group homes are reimbursed at child care center rates and, thus, are included in the child care center analyses. Note. The Office of Early Childhood uses the following age groups for rate setting: infant/toddler, preschool, and school age (see <u>CCDF Draft Plan, section 4.3.4</u>). Thus, infant and toddler data are collapsed throughout this report.

Prior to administering the Market Rate Survey, the 2-1-1 team provided the following introduction. "The Office of Early Childhood is developing the state's federal Child Care Development Fund plan for FFY 2025-2027. This is the primary federal funding for lowincome families who are working, or are participating in approved education or training, to help them pay for child care. In Connecticut, we call this program Care 4 Kids. The plan requires that states conduct a market rate survey to understand the average rate charged by early care and school age providers. Could you please take a few moments to complete this survey. We appreciate your participation and support!"

See Appendices 1 and 2 for complete survey items, which were developed by the Office of Early Childhood and United Way of Connecticut, 2-1-1 Child Care and were administered in Fall 2023.

Participants

Participants were 842 providers (out of 3,316 licensed providers in the state) working in licensed and license-exempt family child care homes, child care centers, and group child care homes in Connecticut, including child care centers that receive federal and state grants or contracts to purchase child care spaces. Due to the low response rate of license-exempt providers (n=4) and for consistency with the 2022 Market Rate Report, these providers were dropped from the present analysis.

Just over half (52.4%) of respondents were licensed family home providers (n=441) and 47.6% were center- or group home-based providers (see Table 2).

*The number available for analysis was 397 providers. The rate of N=397 excludes the n=4 license exempt centerbased child cares. All subsequent analyses are based on this revised Total Participating rate (i.e., 397). As described above, the 10 group home respondents are included in the center/group home category.

Regional response rates (see Table 3) varied for child care center and group home providers (25%-37%) and family child care home providers (20%-30%). These regions also reflect the current child care subsidy payment regions. CCDF requires that rates for the most populous region be reported along with statewide rates if there is regional variation. Per the 2022 American Community Survey data, the North Central region is the most populous in Connecticut. The North Central region also has the highest number of children and families served by Care 4 Kids. As such, the North Central region is used for reporting rates in the CCDF Plan in response to questions regarding the most populous region.

Note. Providers often serve youth in multiple age ranges and, thus, responses by age group are not mutually exclusive. Likewise, not all providers who accept children in a certain age group have children in that age group enrolled. A sample interpretation of these data is as follows: 302 licensed center/group home providers accept infants/toddlers; however, only 208 licensed canter/group home providers had infants/toddlers enrolled at the time of the survey. Together, those 208 providers had 5,415 infants/toddlers enrolled. For analytic purposes, providers who exclusively provided before/after school care were excluded from analyses due to small sample size (n=23). All data were provided by United Way of Connecticut.

Of note, in addition to the 22,000 children in Care 4 Kids child care spaces (see Table 5 for the number of Care 4 Kids providers in Connecticut), Connecticut provides about 17,000 child care spaces for low income and at-risk families through state-funded Child Day Care contracts, School Readiness, and Smart Start grants, in at least 67 communities in the state.¹ Additionally, low-cost preschool education is also available through local education authorities (LEA) public schools, magnet schools and charter schools.

In the present analysis, 96 center-based respondents self-reported that they receive School Readiness and four center-based respondents reported receiving Smart Start grants. There were 346 Licensed Center and 291 Licensed Family provider respondents that accepted Care 4 Kids.

Analytic approach and considerations

Analyses were conducted by the Office of Early Childhood – UConn School of Social Work Partnership Team in consultation with the Office of Early Childhood and United Way of Connecticut.

In this report, a market rate percentile indicates the percentage of child enrollments at or below a weekly price of care rate. To derive these percentiles, the weekly price for each enrolled child was ranked from lowest to highest. For example, the 75th percentile market rate would refer to the price at or below which 75% of enrolled children are charged for child care services. Our analysis further specifies percentiles by provider type, region, and child age group. For instance, the 75th percentile market rate for infant/toddlers in the Northwest region would refer to the price at or below which 75% of enrolled infant/toddlers in the Northwest region are charged for child care services. The Market Rate Survey analysis facilitates comparison of the percentile ranking of the current weekly rates to Care 4 Kids rates in SFY 2024 (July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024). Child care providers participating in the Care 4 Kids program are reimbursed in SFY 2024 at rates that were effective as of July 1, 2023. See Appendix 4 for current Care 4 Kids rates and Tables 12 and 15 for the Care 4 Kids maximum base rates.

The rate comparisons herein do not account for sibling reductions generally given to families with multiple children enrolled in the same facility. Connecticut reimburses providers at the full rate and does not consider the sibling reduction. However, the present report does highlight rates that account for several of the Office of Early Childhood's tiered reimbursement/incentive payments. Specifically, 1) providers caring for a child with special needs receive an additional 25%; 2) licensed family child care home providers with National Association for Family Child Care (NAFCC) accreditation are eligible for an additional 12.5% accreditation incentive payment; and 3) center-based providers who have achieved national accreditation in the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC), New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC), or the Council on Accreditation of Services for Families and Children (COA) receive a 25% incentive payment (see Tables 6-7).

For child care subsidy purposes, Connecticut classifies levels of care as: 1) full-time plus (51-65 hours weekly), 2) full-time (35-50 hours weekly), 3) half-time (16-34 hours weekly), and 4) guarter-time (1-15 hours weekly). In the present report, rate estimates are based on the full-time rate charges reported by each facility. For consistency, estimates for school-age children were measured at the full-time, no school rates, as opposed to before/after school rates, due to limited before/after school data for centers/group homes. Where before/after school rates are reported in Tables 6 and 7, they were computed by multiplying the school age full-time rate by 60%. This methodology was used for both centers/group homes and family child care homes for consistency due





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to the limited center/group home before/after school data and was established in collaboration with the Office of Early Childhood.

The number of children enrolled at each facility was used to establish the frequency of the rates within the data set and percentile values. The number of enrollments by provider setting, age group and region, at the time of the survey, as well as the total number of survey respondents as compared to the total population of licensed child care providers in the state are included in this analysis. Our analysis of the Market Rate Survey yielded rates at the 25th, 50th, 60th, and 75th percentiles.

Results

Percentile Rankings




Figure 1. Market Rate Survey weekly rates at 50th & 75th percentiles: Child care center/group home by region and age

First, Figures 1 (center-based/group home care) and 2 (family child care providers) highlight general trends in the 50th and 75th percentile rates by region and age, based on Market Rate Survey data collected in 2023. Overall, rates are higher for center/group home-based care compared to family child care homes and for infant/toddler care, relative to preschool and school age care. Likewise, rates are generally highest in the Southwest region, though regional differences are often larger in magnitude for child care center/group homes. For instance, compared to other regions, 75th percentile rates in the Southwest region for child care centers/group homes are 21.6%-35.4% higher for infant/toddler care, 26.3%-41.7% higher for preschool care, and 41.4%-49.5% higher for school age care. Similarly, 75th percentile rates in the Southwest region for family child care home providers are 12.5%-37.5% higher for infant/toddler care, 21.8%-35.9% higher for preschool care, and 0%-20.0% higher than other regions for school age care.




Figure 2. Market Rate Survey weekly rates at 50th & 75th percentiles: Licensed family child care home by region and age

Next, Tables 6-9 provide a comparison of market rates to Care 4 Kids rates, which have increased since the last Market Rate report in 2022. Specifically, there was an 11% increase in the Care 4 Kids maximum base rate across all licensed child care provider types, regardless of age group (range: 10.23%-11.14%).² A comprehensive overview of historic Care 4 Kids rates can be found at <u>https://www.ctcare4kids.com/provider-information/payment-rates/</u>.

More specifically, Tables 6 and 7 provide a nuanced examination of how center/group home and family home child care rates vary by child age, and how they compare to the applicable average Care 4 Kids rate. Findings are showcased at the statewide level (Table 6) and for the North Central Region (the most populous region in Connecticut; Table 7). Care 4 Kids rates fall between the 25th and 50th percentile rates, or below the 25th percentile rates.



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As in Tables 6 and 7, Tables 8 and 9 showcase weekly statewide and North Central market rate percentile estimates to Care 4 Kids rates for center/group home and family home providers, stratified by child age, but these tables (8-9) then provide added context around payment incentives for accredited providers and providers who care for children with special needs.

Supplemental 2024 Market Rate Survey Analysis Comparison Tables and Charts

To more visually depict market rate patterns, Figures 3-8 compare the 2024 Care 4 Kids weekly payment rates to the market rates at the 50th percentile, stratified by provider type and child age.


As described above, trends by region, child age, and provider type can be identified. Specifically, these figures showcase that:

- 1) Market rates in the **Southwest region** of Connecticut are **generally higher** than in other regions.
 - a. Specifically, the 50th percentile weekly rates for child care center/group home providers in the Southwest region are 25.3%-36.4% higher than other regions for infant/toddler care, 17.0%-21.5% higher than other regions for preschool care, and 11.6%-20.0% higher than other regions for school age care.
 - b. Similarly, the 50th percentile weekly rates for family child care home providers in the Southwest region are 7.1%-35.7% higher than other regions for infant/toddler care, 6.7%-33.3% higher than other regions for preschool care, and 25.7%-35.7% higher than other regions for school age care.
- 2) Infant/toddler care is generally more expensive than care for preschool or school age children.
 - a. Specifically, on average (i.e., statewide) the 50th percentile infant/toddler rates for child care center/group home providers are \$95-\$125 more expensive than rates for preschool or school age.
 - b. Similarly, on average (i.e., statewide) the 50th percentile infant/toddler weekly rates for family child care home providers are \$25 more expensive than rates for preschool or school age.
- 3) **Center/group home care is generally more expensive** than family child care home-based care (with some exceptions, e.g., see Figures 7-8 on School Age rates).
 - a. For example, on average (i.e., statewide) the 50th percentile weekly rates for child care center/group home providers are 25% higher for infants/toddlers, 2% higher for preschool, but 9% lower for school age children compared to the weekly rates for family child care home providers.
- 4) In state fiscal year 2024, Care 4 Kids rates only meet or exceed the 50th percentile in two instances (i.e., infant/toddler rates in licensed family homes in Eastern region; licensed center/group home preschool rates in Southwestern region).




Figure 4. Licensed family child care home, infant/toddler age

United Way of Connecticut routinely compiles information on the average fees charged by providers by age served and provider type (Table 1), as information on enrollments and openings as part of the Office of Early Childhood's monitoring of child care access by region and age. These data were *not* compiled as part of the Market Rate Survey and reflect the September to December 2023 time period. The methodology for the data referenced below differs from the methods used for the Market Rate Survey. Details on the methodology for the data referenced below can be obtained from United Way of Connecticut.




Figures 1 and 2 depict Care 4 Kids subsidy weekly rates that were in effect July through December 2023 by region and child age.

Glossary of Terms



2-1-1 Child Care – 2-1-1 Child Care helps families find child care to best meet their needs and maintains current listings of licensed and license exempt child care programs in Connecticut. 2-1-1 Child Care provides early care professionals with training, technical assistance and resources.

<u>Care 4 Kids</u> – The Care 4 Kids subsidy program helps low to moderate income families in Connecticut pay for child care costs. The subsidy can cover full-time, parttime, quarter-time and summer care, based on the family's work, training or education schedule. This program is sponsored by the Connecticut Office of Early Childhood.

<u>Child Care Center</u> – Child care centers provide regular care to more than twelve related or unrelated children outside of their homes.

<u>Child Day Care contracts</u> – Child Day Care programs are supported with state funds and provide early care and education to infants and toddlers, preschoolers and/or school age children who meet certain eligibility requirements. At least 60% of households served must have incomes under 75% of the State Medium Income. The purpose of this funding is for the development and operation of child day care centers for children disadvantaged by reasons of economic, social, or environmental conditions.

Family Child Care Home – Family child care homes are private homes that meet the following criteria: (1) providing care for up to six children, including the provider's children, who are not in school full-time; (2) during the school year, providers may take up to three additional children who are in school full-time; (3) if the provider has more than three children in school full-time, all of them are permitted; (4) care is provided for no less than three and no more than twelve hours within a 24-hour period on a regular basis; (5) more than twelve hours of care is allowed on an intermittent basis, but may not exceed 72 consecutive hours.

<u>Group Home</u> – Group child care homes fall provide regular care for not less than seven or more than twelve related or unrelated children, OR meet the definition of a family child care home, but operate in a facility other than a private home.

Market Rate – A market rate is the usual price charged (or "going rate") for goods or services. In the context of this report, the weekly market rates for child care providers (i.e., how much they charge for their services per week) are described based on data collected from providers in the fall of 2023.

School Age – Some providers in this report serve "school age" children between the ages of five and 12. During the school year, this care is available before and/or after school and, in the summer, this care is available full-time.

<u>School Readiness</u> – School Readiness is a state-funded initiative, administered by the Office of Early Childhood, that provides affordable, high-quality early care and education services in high-need communities that help preschool aged children prepare for kindergarten. These programs promote the health and safety of children, prevent or minimize developmental delays, and provide opportunities for





parents to choose among affordable and accredited programs, among other features.

<u>Smart Start grants</u> – Smart Start is a grant program that provides funding to establish or expand a preschool program in the public schools. Smart Start funds are used to increase the number of preschool spots available in public schools. The funds support the operational costs of preschool classrooms.
