
This year, the legislature passed a law¹ updating education requirements for Designated Qualified Staff Members (DQSMs) in **programs funded by School Readiness, Child Day Care contract, State Head Start Supplement, or Smart Start.**²

Some of the main changes in the law add options for working toward a degree in early childhood with supervision and update how the requirements phase in over time. These changes start **July 1, 2025**.

The new law mentioned above supports high quality early childhood experiences through teaching staff with early childhood education coursework and degrees.

As the OEC creates full guidance by revising the General Policy (GP) A-01 and Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs), we are providing an update below to help you and your staff develop education plans.

1. **The OEC will release updated policy guidance—called the General Policy (GP) A-01.** This policy will provide details on the requirements and updated guidance for teaching staff to be QSM eligible.



- 2. The OEC provides debt-free, no student loan scholarship for degrees in early childhood education, as well as CDA credential assessment and one-time renewal fees. These scholarships can support:
 - Degree attainment: Getting an associate or bachelor's degree in early childhood.
 - Degree progression: Moving from a CDA Credential to associate or bachelor's degree, but not the reverse. Individuals who hold degrees <u>should not</u> seek a CDA credential.

Scholarships to Enroll in the 12 Defined Foundational ECE Credits

Starting **mid-May 2025**, the OEC will provide scholarships at partner colleges (CT State community college campuses, Charter Oak State College) for eligible providers to complete up to 12 defined foundational ECE credits:

- The 12 defined foundational credits are made up of four 3-credit early childhood specific college courses
 that the OEC has identified and aligned with the State Department of Education as the key competencies
 for teaching staff in early childhood programs. The courses are:
 - 1. Introduction to Early Childhood Education
 - 2. Child Development
 - 3. Health, Safety, and Nutrition (content combined into one ECE specific course)
 - 4. Child, Family and Community
- **Providers may be eligible if they have fewer than 12 early childhood college credits** to date (as verified in the Registry), even if they have a degree.

3. The OEC continues to strongly encourage programs to actively support staff in achieving DQSM requirements. Teachers should review the guidance based on their current education in the tables below. Please note that these tables (one for centers, group homes, and license-exempt programs and one for family child care

note that these tables (one for centers, group homes, and license-exempt programs and one for family child care providers) provide guidance for providers and staff to act on as the General Policy is being updated. Additional guidance on DQSM qualifications is forthcoming.

Important Notes:

- All earned credits and degrees must be verified in the OEC Registry.
- Non-US degrees (and non-US high school diplomas for the CDA Credential) must have a NACES <u>member</u> equivalency report.

• Earned early childhood education credits are determined using the OEC's <u>Common Standard for Assessing</u> Early Childhood Credits and Degrees.

Programs should advise staff and help them track progress through both individual and program-wide professional development plans. For additional information, see:
